
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
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South Cariboo Summer Festival Event Report

The 2018 South Cariboo Summer Festival was held on Saturday August 11th & Sunday August 12th. The SF had an approximately 2500 people in attendance. Many locals, families and visitors from out of town where in attendance.

Saturday August 11th

- SF was in full swing by 10am with our vendors set up in the arena for the Trade Fair
- Kamloops Skydivers was on site and already holding their preflight consultations for the brave skydivers that would then land right at the airport next to our gate admission booth.
- Our Farm & Outriders arena hosted a number of fun and informative demonstrations for everyone, including Maverick Farms petting zoo and pony rides, Wagon Rides with Tom Jennings, Farrier & Forge with John Stella & Horse Training & demonstrations with Ron Burfoot. As well as the 100 Mile Dog Club Agility.
- Over at the Agriplex Big Horn Archery Club held interactive demonstrations that was enjoyed by all ages.
- Canim Lake Band First Nations Opened the stage with their Welcome Drummers & Dancers.
- -Uncle Chris the Clown entertained all on both the main stage and the kid's area for two separate shows.
- the kids zone was a blast for all the families, with stories, bouncy councils, giant bubbles and many more engaging activities,
- -The Lawn Mower Races where a great hit and was a blast for the riders as well as the audience.

- Due to the ongoing wildfire situation, our Shuswap Story Teller Kenthen Thomas was not able to arrive for his performance, although the Canim Lake Drummers and Dancers had everyone engaged and participating.
- -Although there was a delay with the start the James Gang Band entertained all before the thunder, lightening and rain started to roll in.
- -The Beatles Experience time scheduled to play from 5 8 pm was unfortunately cut short due to the storm.
- -the Beer Gardens with Lac La Hache Bakery fed and hydrated our 19+ guests until the rain cleared everyone out.
- -We had estimated our number to be much higher, and believe they would have been if our region was not once again under evacuation order and alerts, with a heavy storm front moving in. Although we did not have the perfect weather we had hoped for, many spectators were able to experience the whole festival experience before we were forced to close down early Saturday due to the large storm that had rolled in and left our Beatles performers without a safe stage area. Amazingly the Beatles confirmed that they would return Sunday morning to perform before another scheduled performance in Kamloops.

Sunday August 12th

- Sunday brought us cooler temperatures with the smoke clearing which helped start
 off with the rush of people coming to enjoy the pancakes breakfast put on by the
 Wranglers.
- the Trade Fair inside the arena was a busy place again, especially since the Artists where finishing up their garbage cans for auction.
- Our first stage performance was the Beatles Experience who stopped in on their way to another show. All ages had a great time dancing and singing along. Uncle Chris the Clown brought up his group of spectators to enjoy as well.
- We welcomed many vehicles at the Car Show.
- Dutch Courage entertained the crowd and was well received.
- Blackberry Wood Band played for everyone and had the crowd joining in dancing and singing.
- The food vendors once again the kept everyone well fed.
- Maverick Farms and others in the Farm area were once again busy with visitors.
