Provincial Meat Inspection

The overall objective of the provincial meat inspection program is to provide a credible regulatory system that is effective in ensuring food safety and animal welfare, while providing sufficient flexibility to enable a competitive slaughter industry with capacity for livestock producers of all sizes across B.C. The Ministry of Agriculture (Ministry) is committed to working with operators of all types and sizes to support development of cost-effective and innovative slaughter capacity solutions in all regions of the province.

Class D licences are only available in the ten regional districts that have been designated in regulation. Class D licence holders may slaughter up to 11,340 kilograms (25,000 pounds) of their own or other people's animals per year, for direct sales to consumers or to food businesses such as restaurants and meat shops in the regional district in which the meat was produced.

Select Standing Committee on Agriculture, Fish and Food Report

In 2018, the all-party Select Standing Committee on Agriculture, Fish and Food (Committee) led a comprehensive engagement process with stakeholders on the current meat inspection system. The Committee gathered input by travelling throughout the province and speaking with local citizens to ensure opportunity for interested parties to participate.

The Committee released their report with 21 recommendations for government related to licensing and oversight, skilled labour and workforce, and industry growth and development. The Ministry is seeking further feedback on recommendation #3 related to Class D licensing:

#3: Help Class D and E licensed producers reach markets closer to home by investigating alternative boundary restrictions for sales, other than regional districts.

Invite Feedback

To support rural slaughter capacity, the Ministry would like to invite input from local governments on:

- proposals for new Class D regions or sub-regions; and
- designation of new regions or sub-regions.

The Ministry has received submissions related to this topic in the past. This invitation for feedback is an opportunity to present new ideas, and for updating and consideration of previous input in the context of the Committee's report.

Class D Licence

The class D licence allows on-farm slaughter of 1-25 animal units* for direct sale to consumers or retail sales to secondary food establishments (for example, restaurants and meat shops) within the boundaries of the region where the meat was produced. Class D licensees may slaughter their own, or other peoples' animals. Class D licences are available in 10 provincially designated regions.

Class E Licence

The class E licence allows on-farm slaughter of 1-10 animal units* annually for direct sale to consumers. Sales are restricted to the region in which the meat was produced and operators are only permitted to slaughter their own animals.

Class E Licences are only available when slaughter services are not available to the producer.

In order to support local slaughter capacity and local food security, the Ministry of Agriculture is reducing the travel time restriction associated with Class E applications from 2 hours to 1 hour. The Ministry of Agriculture will recommend against a Class E licence if a Class A or B abattoir is located within one hour travel time of the proposed Class E establishment.

How to Apply

Complete the following steps to apply for a class D or class E licence. If the operation is located in a nondesignated area, a <u>class E feasibility study (PDF)</u> is required prior to applying to a SlaughterSafe training course.

- 1. SlaughterSafe training course
- 2. Food safety plan for the operation
- 3. Site assessment with the regional health authority
- 4. Class D/Class E application form (PDF, 32 KB)
- <u>Submit your application package to your regional health authority.</u>

Compliance

Environmental health officers and meat inspectors are addressing illegal meat sales and lack of compliance through warnings and ticketing. Make sure you know the regulations that apply to your establishment.

Dear CRD Staff and Board,

As a small scale meat producer I support the SSMPA position on this review. The Cariboo has lost significant access to certified slaughter in the last several years causing hardship for many small producers. Our farm struggled for several years before recently becoming Class E certified. We are grateful for the ability to obtain a Class E license in the Cariboo; however, given the choice prefered a Class D. But this option was not available to us, despite not having a certified facility that would take our animals.

In addition, the restrictions of the Class D and E licenses meant that longtime clients can no longer purchase our products. As a small farm business trying to grow to profitability it is a significant setback to lose existing customers, especially on the heels of our 2017 wildfire losses.

Our farm abides by all the licensing requirements, safety procedures, and management best practices from regular water testing, to IHA inspections to environmental farm certification. As a small producer we pay the same fees for water and more for certification than the neighboring large producer pays and while they have access to all markets, government support and funding, our farm is restricted by government regulations and receives no support or funding. In a regional district built on agriculture I hope you can see the challenge with this.

To Whom it May Concern,

It was just brought to our attention that the Ministry of Agriculture is seeking input from local governments with regards to Class D licenses. In particular, they are interested in feedback pertaining to:

- proposals for new Class D regions or sub-regions; and
- designation of new regions or sub-regions.

The class D license allows on-farm slaughter of 1-25 animal units (One animal unit means: combined weight, when measured alive, of 1,000 lbs (454 kg) of meat) for direct sale to consumers or retail sales to secondary food establishments (for example, restaurants and meat shops) within the boundaries of the region where the meat was produced. Class D licensees may slaughter their own, or other peoples' animals. Class D licenses are available in 10 provincially designated regions.

Abattoir capacity and meat processing is one of the biggest challenges facing smallscale producers across BC so we urge you to take the time to provide feedback to the Ministry of Agriculture on this issue.

We recommend that Class D licenses be available in ALL regions. Currently, Class D licenses are only available in 10 regional districts. There is too much variation in situations for a Regional District boundary to be rational. For example, one of our members has a Class D in Lillooet. His neighbour is 5 km FURTHER from the nearest abattoir, but in the TNRD so he can not slaughter on farm under a Class D licence, because the TNRD is not a 'designated regional district'. This position is supported by the BC Chamber of Commerce (see attached).

We recommend that the distribution of un-inspected meat not be restricted by regional districts. The strict limit on slaughter capacity and sales outlets provides sufficient control over the distribution of uninspected product without limiting where a producer sells. Currently, Class D & E Licenses established and regulated under the Meat Inspection Regulation, and are overseen by the regional health authorities under the direction of the Ministry of Agriculture. Since all Class D & E licensees are regulated provincially and must adhere to the same rules & regulations, they should be able to sell their product anywhere in the province.
