Our major fundraising activity is the annual Winter Arts & Crafts Fair held each November. Next year we will be presenting a second fair in April to coincide with the Cyclone Taylor Cup. The fair sees up to 30 crafters vending their artistic crafts to the public. Funds are raised by charging vendors \$ 75 for vending spaces and by charging the public a \$2 admission fee. Secondary funding is through grants from the BC Arts Council and local government (100 Mile House and the CRD).

Our artistic member groups apply to us each year for an annual grant. Our primary goal is to meet these grant requests to support our local artists. History, Mandate, Mission and Core Values

Established in 1974 and incorporated in 1975, the 100 Mile & District Arts Council is a volunteer-run, community-based umbrella organization for local arts and culture groups. We have no paid staff and no (other than bank accounts) physical assets. We rent meeting and archival storage space from one of our member groups (South Cariboo Arts and Culture Society). We are dedicated to developing opportunities for area residents to experience and/or participate in creative and cultural endeavors.

The 100 Mile & District Arts Council is pleased that, through its member groups, it is able to broadly serve the arts community. The Arts Council supports and encourages the arts in all fields regardless of the age, religion, sex or ethnic origin of the performer, artist, artisan, or audience member.

Some of the objects of the Society, as listed in our constitution, are

- to increase and broaden the opportunities for residents of 100 Mile House and surrounding district to enjoy and participate in cultural activities;
- to help coordinate the work and programs of cultural groups in the District;
- to render service to all participating groups;
- to act as a clearinghouse for information on cultural projects and activities;
- to bring to the attention of civic and provincial authorities the cultural needs of this community.

We believe our objectives are essentially a scaled-down version of the BC Arts Council's mandate: "[T]he BC Arts Council... supports a range of activities that includes funding for professional artists and arts organizations, community initiatives, training and scholarships." Within our budget restraints, we support local artists and art organizations, who, in turn create community initiatives and supply training to their own members and others. We also offer scholarships to graduating or recently graduated high school students.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER AT: 2:00 p.m.

AGENDA: The agenda was circulated, with the following addition:

- 4a) Martin Exeter Hall update on stage floor (Barb & Karen)

Gord moved and Barb seconded that the agenda be adopted as amended. CARRIED.

MINUTES FROM LAST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING: The minutes of the Feb. 13, 2018 annual general meeting were reviewed. Bruce pointed out that the update from the 100 Mile Festival of the Arts was missing from the minutes. Tammie requested that minutes be emailed out ahead of time so members and reps have time to review them prior to the meeting. Gord noted that he normally does that but it was missed this time. Doris moved and Karen seconded that the minutes be adopted. CARRIED.

4. OLD BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES:

a) MARTIN EXETER HALL — Barb and Karen met with the Joint Committee on May 13 to discuss the proposal of replacing the stage floor at MEH. They want Barb and Karen to be in charge of putting together and running the committee to get the ball rolling. Barb will be finding out who she needs to collaborate with for the committee. In addition to asking for new flooring they are looking at extending the back of the stage by two feet. The committee will be formed in the fall. Karen noted that the 100 Mile Performing Arts Society will be donating its proceeds from the recent Barkerville variety show towards the new stage floor (\$2,257.33). A letter from the 100 Mile Festival of the Arts should be forthcoming detailing their potential contributions as well.

5. CORRESPONDENCE:

- 6. TREASURER'S REPORT Karen circulated the latest financial report and statements as prepared by Gary Brooks. Karen noted that Gary has discovered that two \$500 scholarships were not paid out from 2017, as the recipients didn't get back to the board with their proof of enrolment etc. The \$1000 has been credited back towards the 2018 scholarships. Later in the meeting it was noticed that Gary mislabeled the BC grant funding for the Art Crawl. Karen said she'd inform him and make the change. Barb moved and Bobbie seconded that the reports be received. CARRIED.

7. ACTIVITY REPORT (formerly President's Report)

A written report by Gord and Barbara was circulated and reviewed. It outlined some of the AC's new projects over the past year including the Trash to Treasure fundraiser and this year's Art Crawl as well as the pilot program offering stipends to travelling professional musicians. The report also discussed our ongoing situation with the BC Arts Council including our two years of being on Fair Notice and our recent discovery that we would not be receiving our annual operating grant from the BCAC this year.

8. MEMBER GROUP REPORTS

<u>South Cariboo Weavers & Spinners</u> (Heather Black) – The weavers and spinners continue to meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month at Parkside. Several members took part in the Williams Lake Guild Spin last month and many members are preparing for the ANWG coming up in Prince George. Workshops are held once a month for newcomers and those who want to learn new techniques. A big focus is currently being placed on preparing for the Art Crawl in June.

<u>Eclectica Community Choir</u> (Walt Sherry) – The choir's first performance of the year took place March 2 in Williams Lake at the parade of choirs, where the group helped raise money for the Cariboo Memorial Hospital. The choir presented its benefit concert for the 100 Mile Hospital, Fischer Place & Mill Site Lodge on May 11 at Martin Exeter Hall. The choir won't be performing at the 108 Heritage Site for Canada Day this year. Registration for the fall season will take place Sept. 11, 18 and 25.

<u>Cariboo Artists Guild</u> (Bobbie Crane) – CAG resumed its monthly meetings March 5. Dates for the Summer Art Show and Sale are July 25 – Sept 7, this year's theme is Cast Shadows. Showcase Gallery exhibits include Katalin Kovacs (April), Penny Bailey (May) and Helen Kellington (June).

100 Mile Festival of the Arts (Brian Porritt) – Annual festival was held April 1-13, and was very successful. The showcase concert was held April 13 and also a great success. Will be seven participants attending the PABC Festivat! this year plus the PSO Vocal Ensemble. The PSO scholarship recipient has been selected and will be presented at the scholarship tea June 5. The AGM will take place June 18 at Parkside, doors open at 6:30 p.m.

<u>Log Cabin Quilters</u> (Rene Lafavor) – The group is meeting twice a month. They've had great response for their chemo quilts and preemie quilts. They are also working on fire hall quilts in case the need should arise this wildfire season. They'll be holding a quilting show next year at Interlakes.

South Cariboo Arts & Culture Society (Tammie Ozanne) – The group has undertaken a number of upgrades to Parkside including painting, new sink / taps, new bathroom lock and new floor in resource

room. They will now be taking on the project of making Parkside wheelchair accessible, and a grant is in process to help with the costs.

100 Mile Performing Arts (Karen Smith) — The group's presentation of Four Shorts, A Night of Comedy was well received by enthusiastic crowds. Missoula Children's Theatre has been booked for Sept. 16-21, and will be presenting the Snow Queen. The group hosted Mrs. McGinley's Gold Rush Variety Show on May 10, it was a great show with a large audience, which brought in \$2,257.33 in profits. Plans are underway for a musical in March 2020. A decision has been made on which show, but details are being finalized.

Stemete 7 uw'i Friendship Centre (Rob Diether) as read aloud by Gord — the summary written by Rob highlighted the Frienship Centre's events planned for June, including a National Indigenous Day feast, two evenings of beginner fiddle lessons by Mary Thomas, Father's Day luncheon June 11 with the Canim Lake Elders, three evenings of Secwepemclanguage workshops, music circle June 22, introduction to west coast art technique June 24/25 and an open house. The Friendship Centre is looking forward to its involvement in the upcoming Art Crawl, and will be showcasing First Nations themed paintings, including some by Patsy Granberg.

9. STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

- a) Scholarships there will only be one scholarship handed out this year to Katrina Hansen in the field of Visual Arts (Barb).
- b) Winter Arts & Crafts Fair the application packages will be ready to mail out around the middle of June (Tammie).

10. NOMINATION & ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS

The following board members have agreed to stay on to fulfill their terms:

1st year of two year term: Doris, Gord, Bruce, Tammie

2nd year of two year term: Walt, Barb, Bobbie, Melissa, Karen

Discussion ensued about how to recruit more board members. Melissa agreed to posting something on the Facebook page regarding our need for new members, and Bobbie said she would ask Rob at the Friendship Centre if anyone there would be willing to join.

11. OTHER BUSINESS

- a) BC Arts Council funding—Gordon provided the member group reps with a summary of our situation with the BCAC and our loss of our basic operating grant. The BCAC believes that we don't meet the guidelines for receiving our grant money. We have tried to remedy and change our ways over the past two years but this year discovered we wouldn't be receiving our operating grant (approx \$5000). Barb noted two of the main concerns were lack of accountability with what our member groups did with the funds, and lack of First Nations engagement. Discussion ensued as to what can be done and how member groups might be able to support us in our attempt to get our funding back. No clear path at this time as to what we are going to do moving forward and how our member groups will be affected.
- b) Art Crawl & Trash to Treasure at Summer festival (Bobbie) The Art Crawl has 24 businesses and 25 artists confirmed. The booklet will be going to press at the end of the month and should be in hands in

100 Mile for June 6th. Bobbie met with the Lions Club and secured \$250 in funding for supplies to build table top and floor easels (made by Doug Vaughan). The Arts Council will get to keep the easels once the Art Crawl is done and can then lend or rent them out as needed. Cost for supplies is \$204.12.

The Trash to Treasure fundraiser is confirmed for the Summer Festival (Aug. 10/11) at Canlan. Five artists have expressed interest. They will be painting two trash cans and two beer tubs. Melissa will send out a schedule for the Arts Council table a bit closer to the event for volunteers to book their time slots.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Arts Council accounts for its activities on a fund accounting basis appropriate for a society using the deferral method. No amortization is recorded on capital assets.

The Arts Council has changed its fiscal year end to April 30 from September 30 for the 2018 yearend, resulting in a seven month reporting period for the April 2018 yearend.

3. PURPOSE OF THE COUNCIL

The Council is incorporated under the Societies Act of British Columbia. The Council is a volunteer-run, community-based organization dedicated to developing opportunities for area residents to experience and/or participate in creative and cultural endeavours.

4. SPECIAL PROJECTS FUND

These are funds put aside for worthwhile events promoting the Arts hosted by the Arts Council or a Member Group, and include concerts, stage performances, artistic displays, and also include funding for Member Group Grants, which are awarded in May.

5. SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

The Council is committed to providing annual scholarships to graduate students of Peter Skene Ogden Secondary School on the following amounts. The scharships are awarded in June.
