COVID-19



Northern BC community immunization coverage

As of September 15, 2021, the Northern BC population as seen: 360,470 doses administered; 74% of population age 12 and older have received at least one dose (64% are fully immunized with two doses). For more detailed community information, see the full chart.


BC proof of vaccination card

By order of the Provincial Health Officer (PHO), proof of vaccination is now required to access some events, services and businesses in BC. Under the order, you must have at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine. By October 24, you must be fully vaccinated. The requirement is in place until January 31, 2022 and could be extended.

Details on places vaccine cards are required for entry can be found here.

It is important to note that proof of vaccination is **not** required to vote in-person in the September 20 federal election. Meetings of local authority councils and school boards, where members of the public attend in person, are also exempt.

Supporting Harm Reduction within the context of COVID-19

Northern Health has deemed harm reduction and overdose prevention services as an essential service during the COVID-19 public health emergency. Although the messaging regionally and provincially around COVID-19 preventative measures will reduce the spread of COVID-19, they may further isolate our most vulnerable populations. Therefore it is vital that we find innovative and creative ways to meet the urgent needs of people who use drugs in our communities.
