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## **COVID-19**

### **Northern Health critical care patients moved south**

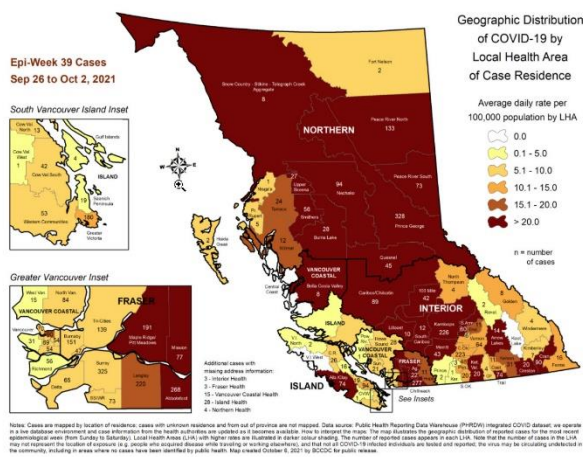
Recently, 55 critical care patients have been transferred from Northern Health to hospitals on Vancouver Island, in the Fraser Health Authority, and Vancouver Coastal Health. Of those 55, 43 are positive for COVID-19, and 42 were not fully vaccinated. Over the Thanksgiving weekend alone, 14 people were transferred. There are 40 critical care base beds in all of northern BC. There are 42 patients with COVID-19 from the North in critical care. A further 23 surge beds that have been added to critical care capacity in the North, for a total of

On October 12, BC Minister of Health Adrian Dix said, "for those people walking around unvaccinated who might be in those critical care beds in two or three weeks, I say to them now is the time, surely. Now is the time to get vaccinated. For the whole health care system, all-in in support, now is the time to get vaccinated."

## Proof of vaccination and the BC Vaccine Card

The BC Vaccine Card is now the only acceptable proof of vaccination for British Columbians to enjoy certain businesses and recreational events safely.

For Northern Health, Environmental Public Health Team responds to incoming complaints related to the Provincial Health Officer (PHO) orders (face coverings and vaccine status, for instance). The Environmental Public Health Team will reach out to non-compliant facilities to provide education, and then follow progressive enforcement processes that could include ticketing and potential closure orders.

### Take Home Naloxone Program Report Review of Data to December 2020 Available Now

#### Take Home Naloxone (THN) Program Report

Toward the Heart published the [THN program evaluation report](#) this week, which includes a review of data until December 2020. Notable findings and recommendations include:

- The BC THN program saw increased kit shipment and reported distribution in 2020 amidst ongoing dual public health emergencies
- Kit distribution to individuals actively responding to overdoses is increasing over time (50.4% of all kits reported distributed in 2020 were to replace a used kit)
- More than 94,000 kits have been reported as used to reverse an

overdose since the program began

- Naloxone administration records indicate that 1-3 doses of naloxone are most commonly administered during an overdose response event
- There is evidence of a decreasing trend in police presence at overdose events when 911 is called based on naloxone administration records
- Involving people with lived and living experience (PWLLE) in program practice and evaluation is important to ensure that services are accessible, acceptable, accommodating and affordable

The success of the THN program would not be possible without the advocacy, expertise and tireless efforts of people with lived and living experience who continue to be on the frontlines of the drug toxicity crisis as well as community partners and colleagues at the BCCDC, Regional Health Authorities and the Ministry of Health.
