An Overview of Hospice Care in the Cariboo

Purpose of Hospice Care

To provide individuals of all ages diagnosed with terminal illness or at the end of their lives a dignified and compassionate end of life, as well as to support their families (<u>Canada.ca</u>).

Hospice Care as defined by Interior Health

Hospice palliative care is a philosophy of care and services which help relieve suffering and improve quality of life for people with a life-limiting illness. Hospice palliative care does not hasten or delay death. Hospice palliative care is about access to the best possible quality of life at the end of life.

Hospice care can include:

- Care to help relieve symptoms such as pain, nausea, shortness of breath, fatigue, insomnia,
- Information on services and care options, legal and financial matters,
- Teaching for families on how to provide or assist with care,
- Spiritual support,
- · Emotional support,
- Referrals to available services, such as volunteers or counseling.

Types of Hospice Care

- Routine home care,
- Continuous home care,
- · General inpatient care,
- Children's hospice,
- Grief and bereavement services for family members,
- Therapies (music, spiritual, emotional, group etc.).

Context for hospice care in the Cariboo

- Care bed availability in the Cariboo: 2 palliative care beds in Williams Lake, 3 dedicated palliative beds and 3 respite beds for community use in Quesnel, and equipment for home care and 4 care beds are available in 100 Mile House
- Total number of beds is: 12 beds
- There is a large array of hospice services, such as at-home, children's and Indigenous hospice care, that can be offered. Currently, in the Cariboo, hospice services generally support people over the age of 70 and there are no specialized palliative services provided (e.g. children's or Indigenous centred hospice care)
