However, we spoke to Mainline Roofing in Williams Lake and feel that repair will be about \$4500.00.

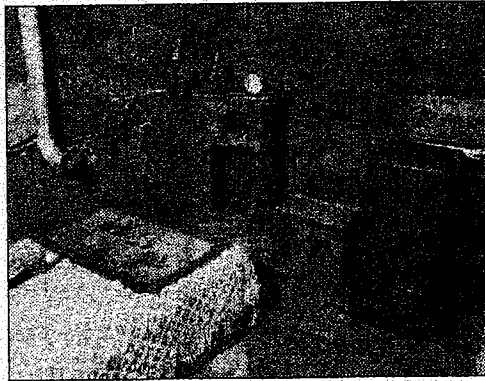

Diefenbunker Cold War reminder in Lone Butte

A tiny concrete building nestles in the trees in the centre of downtown Lone Butte. Known as the Diefenbunker, it serves as a forgotten reminder of the Cold War era. Constructed between 1959 and 1961 under the direction of then-Prime Minister John Diefenbaker as a nuclear fall-out shelter, many of the locals have no idea it exists. A sign on the front porch states that "in the event of a nuclear

war between the United States of America and the Union of the Soviet Socialist Republics, the resident postmaster would have a place to live during the crisis." The actual purpose behind the bunker was to supply the resident postmaster, at that time Margaret Alice Singleton, with a radio and Geiger counter. Once a day she was to put on protective gear and venture outside to take readings of the air quality and report back to Ottawa. Once the air was declared safe, local

residents would be notified it was safe to come home. "From where, I do not know," Singleton's sign states. Unlike the Diefen-

bunker in Ottawa, these small bunkers were very basic in nature. The inside of the building is dark, cold and depressing. The idea of being shut up in it for any length of time is unsettling, said Lone Butte Historical Association (LBHA) member Gayle Jones. "It would have been quite terrible," Jones said. "Like a tomb," agreed LBHA member Chris Schmidt. A short hallway leads to the doorway to the living area. There is no door but two slots on opposite sides of the opening suggest a rod, possibly with a curtain hung there at one time. A single bed, radio and heater are the

main pieces of furniture in the room. There isn't room for much else. "We have embellished things, like what we figured it would look like," said Jones. "We don't really know." There is little information on the bunker itself, how it was built, who built it and what year. The building was an empty shell when the LBHA took over its maintenance along with the Alice Singleton Heritage House. Unlike the Diefenbunker, the Heritage House has a long and colourful history.

When the Red Cross purchased the building they added on to the original log house, building a three-bedroom Red Cross Outpost Hospital. The additions were built with a hospital in mind as can be seen in the extra-wide interior doors built to fit a full-size hospital bed. The hospital opened on Sept. 25, 1948 with Registered Nurse A.D. Mansell in charge. Before its doors closed in early 1959 several other

nurses would serve communities care needs. The post office bunker were built by Singleton's parents, Wilfred and Edna Ledger, purchased the property in 1918. The post office remained there until Singleton retired in 1978.

we have had a successful year.

We have had some of our fund raisers again. We have raffle tickets and had a very successful Lone Butte Rocks. Also have received \$3500 in grants to help us with projects we are doing. We got \$5,000 from the Cariboo Regional District, grant for assistance, which we gratefully acknowledge and are thankful for their continued support. We did have a donation in 2021 of \$500 from Donna Barnett. We continue to receive a Park Operational Agreement from the C R D in the amount of \$4500.

This year we opened Water Tower Park at our usual time, May long weekend and are open until long weekend in October. Our garage, bake, ticket sales, donations and concession on Lone Butte Rocks brought in over \$1800. Great day with Mark Allen – Musician, Brian Williams and his shooting gallery, some medieval fighters & weavers & spinners adding to one of our best Lone Butte Rocks.

We have built a cover over one of our picnic tables. It is in memory of past president, Al Jones. It will be "Al's Gazebo". We hired carpenter, Paul Neilsen, along with some of our hardy volunteers, to build this structure. Steve from Interlakes Rona was very helpful in providing us with everything needed to build it, DBD Log Homes, lumber, Al Vincent of Lone Butte Towing to help lift up the heavy beams. It cost just over \$6000 to build, with \$4205 in donations, \$1000 from C R D grant for assistance and fundraising.

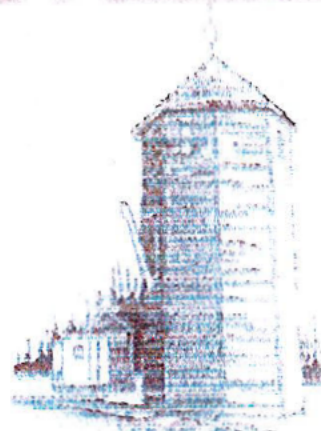

We had a good work bee to fill in old wood and coal chutes to the basement, with concrete. That will help with lower heating costs. We had Dave Rastad of KADA Renovations to repair a roofing problem. At a cost of \$1000.

Lone Butte Pioneer Cemetery bench got a much needed coat of stain. We need to weed whack in there again this fall.

At this year end we have 71 members. Please come out and join us at our AGM. Thank you all for your continued support. Also, on Sat, September 17, WTP, 3:30, come join us for a pot luck get together.
