1. What plans has your organization made to fund its activities over the next 3-5 years?

We rely heavily on local businesses in 100 Mile House and provincial grants to fund our two major programs and keep them free for students. This may involve in-kind donations of machinery, staff time, in-house training, or PPE equipment. We secure sponsors and donations on an annual basis.

3. What are your organization's specific goals and objectives for this year? How do they differ from previous years?

Our goal this year is to raise enough funds to keep two major 100 Mile House programs free for students. In the early years, we invited 100 Mile House students to join the Williams Lake programs, but interest in these programs have grown and we now receive enough applications to give Peter Skene Ogden students their own programs closer to home.

The Covid-19 pandemic impacted several businesses that regularly support our programs and we had difficulty covering all our costs for this past year. We need to secure grants for the following:

- Junior Fire Crew to cover the costs of the six students attending the Occupational First Aid Level 1 and the Transportation Endorsement certification courses delivered through Thompson Rivers University.
- Heavy Metal Rocks to cover the costs of OFA1 for twelve students, food for twenty
 participants and trainers, and overnight security for the pit.
- 4. Who does your organization serve?

The Career Programs department serves students within School District No. 27. The Junior Fire Crew program and the Heavy Metal Rocks program specifically target students in grades 11 and 12 who attend Peter Skene Ogden Secondary (100 Mile House) and Lake City Secondary (Williams Lake) schools. Of these two programs, PSO students make up 33% of total participants.

Project Summary Sheet

1. Brief Description of Proposed Use of Grant Being Applied for:

Our Junior Fire Crew program is offered in partnership with the Cariboo Fire Centre for up to eight students in grades 12. Through this partnership, our students participate in comprehensive training and course work provided by Storm Riders Unit Crew staff and local volunteer instructors to become wildland firefighters. The Cariboo Fire Centre uses this program as a key recruitment tool for hiring. Upon completion of the mandatory training students will be qualified to apply for two positions on the Junior Fire Crew for summer 2023. The grant will cover the cost of six students attending the OFA1 and Transportation Endorsement courses.

Our Heavy Metal Rocks program trains twelve students on heavy equipment, with twelve trainers, over two days at a gravel pit. Upon interview and selection, students will undergo precertification courses to prepare them for a safe and rewarding experience in the pit where they will explore career choices as heavy equipment operators in the construction, mining, and logging industries. This grant will help us cover the costs of OFA1 for twelve students, food for participants and trainers, and overnight security for the pit.

- 2. How do you know there is a need for this service/project in our community? Local businesses in our communities are struggling to fill positions with qualified candidates. Our Junior Fire Crew and Heavy Metal Rocks programs provide free training for high school students and allow them to make personal connections with local employers through volunteer instructors and trainers of the program.
- Is your agency applying for funds from other levels of government or other sources for this project?
 Yes.
- 4. Would you still be able to complete the project if you do not receive the other funds applied for?
 Yes.
- 5. Please describe the impact of this application being denied or approval of an amount less than requested.
 - Dependent on the status of funding from other sources, we may request a fee from student participants to offset the costs of the program and/or reduce the pre-certification courses provided to students which will impact the equipment they can use.
- 6. **Start date of project:** Junior Fire Crew launched on October 18th with classroom visits at Peter Skene Ogden. Heavy Metal Rocks steering committee met November 15th and will launch mid-January with classroom visits.

End date of project: Junior Fire Crew and Heavy Metal Rocks will both wrap up their programs in May.

For example, a past participant in the Heavy Metal Rocks program is now a valued member of our 100 Mile House Steering Committee, Casey Lang.

For Junior Fire Crew, this program is there most effective recruiting tool. We measure success by their ability to hire out of the program and retain workers.
