Dear Chair Richmond and Directors:

Establishment of an Urgent and Primary Care Centre (UPCC) Walk-In Clinic in Williams Lake Re:

In April, City of Williams Lake Council and staff met with Diane Shendruk, Vice President, Clinical Operations - IH North, and Kathy Doull, Executive Director, Clinical Operations IH West to discuss the state of health care in our community.

At these meetings, the critical physician shortage was, not surprisingly, identified as the most urgent issue facing our community. During our discussion, it was verified that an estimated 40-60% or 12,000-15,000 people are without doctors in the Cariboo-Chilcotin IHA catchment area.

Currently, patients without a doctor must go to the ER to even get a prescription for critical medication, and may not seek or receive medical attention due to the numerous barriers to receiving care. It is imperative that residents requiring medical attention do not burden an already critically understaffed ER, or simply go without medical assistance. The current situation is absolutely unacceptable.

The City of Williams Lake has requested that Interior Health Authority implement an Urgent and Primary Care Centre (UPCC) walk-in clinic in Williams Lake on an urgent basis. As Cariboo Memorial Hospital is a regional hospital serving Williams Lake residents as well as those from outlying areas, taking some of the strain off this extremely busy hospital through the establishment of a UPCC would seem to be a reasonable solution. We urge you to support the immediate implementation of a UPCC walk-in clinic in Williams Lake to help address this critical issue.

We realize the situation is systemic and there are many underlying factors resulting in the provincewide medical professional shortage, but we cannot wait for the system to be "fixed." Although a short-term solution, a UPCC would help address the needs of the residents that IHA is expected to serve, while allowing our hospital's ER staff to focus on emergency response. We sincerely hope you will help advocate for this essential service.
