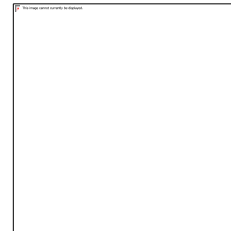
### Northern Health CEO Cathy Ulrich honored by First Nations Health Authority

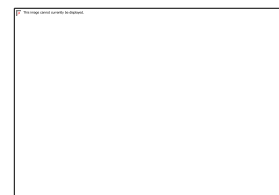
### **Kitselas donates \$10,000**

### Blue-green algae tips for summer – have fun but be safe around the lake

Summer brings many things, including enjoying our time on the many lakes in northern BC. For those living on lakes year-round, part time, or just visiting, it's important to stay healthy while enjoying the experience.



With the warming weather, blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms may appear in lakes across northern BC. Blue-green algae are naturally occurring and can look like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water. Blue-green algae can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, or pinkish-red, and often smells musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae, or who ingest water containing toxins from blue-green algae, may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced. [Read more.](#)

## OVERDOSE PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

### Supports expanding for people in mental-health, substance-use crisis

People in a mental-health or substance-use crisis will have the support of experts as new mobile, integrated-response teams are coming to nine communities throughout the province, including Prince Rupert.

## Toxic drug alert: Dawson Creek

There has been an increase in overdoses in Dawson Creek linked to a bright orange/red powder, a blue substance sold as crystal meth, and possibly other coloured substances causing sudden overdose, requiring hospitalization and lengthy monitoring.

## BC Coroners Services - Illicit Drug Toxicity Deaths

### BC Summary

The rate of unregulated drug deaths in BC is 45.5 deaths per 100,000 individuals in 2023. In 2023, there have been 1228 suspected unregulated drug deaths. There were 184 suspected unregulated drug deaths in June 2023. The June numbers represents a 17% increase over the number of deaths in June 2022 (157) and a 2% increase from May 2023. The number of unregulated drug deaths in June 2023 equates to about 6.1 deaths per day.



By Health Authority (HA), in 2022, the highest **rates** were in Northern Health (60 deaths per 100,000 individuals) and Vancouver coastal (56.8 deaths per 100,000 individuals); the highest **number** of unregulated drug deaths were in Fraser and Vancouver Coastal

Health Authorities (338 and 363 deaths, respectively), making up 57% of all such deaths during 2023.

### Trends

- Smoking was the most common mode of drug consumption in 2023 with 67% showing evidence of smoking followed by injection (16%), nasal insufflation (13%), and oral (5%)
- In 2023, 81% of unregulated drug deaths occurring inside (private residences, other inside residence including social and supportive housing, SROs, shelters, and hotels etc.) and 18% occurring outside in vehicles, sidewalks, streets, parks etc.
- There is no indication that prescribed safe supply is contributing to unregulated drug deaths.

### Northern Health Summary

In 2023, NH has the highest rate of unregulated drug deaths in the province with a rate of 60.0 deaths per 100,000 individuals (N=92).

In June 2023, the rate of unregulated drug deaths was 4.9 per 100,000 (N=15).

- **The Northwest** has seen **29** unregulated drug deaths in 2023 for a rate of 74.2 deaths per 100,000 individuals. This is the second highest rate in BC.
- June 2023 there were **2** unregulated drug deaths rate of 3.8 deaths per 100,000 individuals
- **The Northern Interior** has seen **55** unregulated drug deaths in 2023 for a rate of 71.0 deaths per 100,000 individuals. This is the third highest rate in BC.
- June 2023 there were **10** unregulated drug deaths rate of 6.5 deaths per 100,000 individuals
- **The Northeast** has seen **8** unregulated drug deaths in 2023 for a rate of 21.7 deaths per 100,000 individuals. This is the third lowest rate in BC.
- June 2023 there were **2** unregulated drug deaths rate of 2.7 deaths per 100,000 individuals

## COVID-19

COVID is still with us, in our communities, impacting our friends and loved ones. Vaccinations remain the best defence against both influenza and COVID-19.

The COVID-19 spring booster program in BC is now complete. If you still want a spring booster shot you can:

- Use your existing invitation through the [Get Vaccinated system](#) and make an appointment

BC is now planning for a COVID-19 booster program in fall 2023 based on latest recommendations and vaccines to be approved by Health Canada.

Beyond vaccinations, we can all take key preventive measures to avoid illness, including:

- Stay at home if you feel unwell and try to avoid spending time with people at higher risk of serious illness.
- Practice respiratory etiquette: wear a mask in crowded, public spaces, and cough and sneeze into your elbow.
- Clean your hands regularly.
- Avoid touching your face, especially your eyes, mouth and nose.
