PROJECT INFORMATION

1. Brief Description of Proposed Use of Grant Being Applied For:

The funds will be used for Grandparent Camp 2024. This camp allows an opportunity for Grandparents and their Grandchildren to come to camp for a 2-night, 3-day stay where they can disconnect to reconnect. We have managed to keep costs low with private donations (Year 1) and grants from both the City of Williams Lake & the CRD (Year 2). We would like to offer this camp twice next summer and we would like to keep costs low to reduce the financial barrier for those wishing to attend. Last year we were able to keep costs to \$175/Grandparent and \$125/Grandchild. This year, we would raise prices only by \$10/person should we be successful with our Grants from the CRD & the City of Williams Lake once again.

2. How do you know there is a need for this service/project in our community?

We see Age-Friendly Intergenerational Programming as integral to providing unique programming in our community moving forward with an aging population. Gavin Lake provides a perfect venue for these super fun camps. As far as we have found, we are the only ones offering this type of camp in this province. Now heading into Year 3, I can say that the experience is very special for those who attend. We had a great group for Year 1, sold out for Year 2 and for Year 3, we have 40 families interested already before we have really even done any advertising. The feedback we have received is that not having to cook and clean and simply spending quality time with their loved ones has been invaluable, let alone the various activities and programs that they get to participate in.

3. Start date of the project: 7/8/2024 **End date for the project:** 7/19/2024

4. Describe the key activities and timelines to complete this project: Demand is such that we are aiming to provide two sessions in 2024. The first from July 8-10 and the 2nd from July 17-19. We will once again set our maximum to 18 children as that seems to be the magic number for our program. The Program Administrator's job starts in November when the camp is advertised and registrations start to be received. The administrator is responsible for all communication throughout 2024 leading up to and after camp. Attached is the Registration Package for 2024 (Draft) which helps to go over what participants can expect from their time at camp.

5. How will you determine if the project/event was successful? For 2023, we sent out a survey to participants to get their feedback on what to keep the same and what to change. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive with very few things participants wanted to see changed for the future. In addition, most participants would like to return again in coming years. We will do the same survey for 2024.

6. Does your organization have sustainable funding? Please explain. Gavin Lake has a funding base of 25 different funders and vast community support. We also charge a fee for rental of the camp groups. Rates vary for schools (free, not-for-profit & youth groups (\$575/night) and adult/for-profit group (\$900/night).

8. Describe the impact of this application being denied or approval of an amount less than requested. Will you be able to complete the project/event if you do not receive the funds applied for?

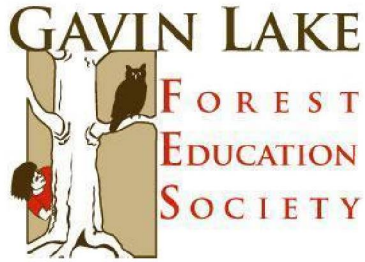

2022 Treasurer's Report

The figures presented in this report are derived from the Treasurer's records. The Financial Statements were prepared by Cameron & Co. and have been submitted to the CRA.

As of December 31, 2022, the Market Value of our funds with Credential was \$109,042.09. Most of these savings are in a low risk, high interest savings account and approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ of the investments are in slightly higher risk funds. Throughout the course of 2022, we replaced \$30,000 (\$15,000 in June & \$15,000 in November) to the fund to replace in full the money withdrawn due to Covid.

We received the Experience Matters grant from the Federal Government for \$2,000.00. The total employment cost of the Experience Matters employee was \$3,619.79. Therefore, the cost to GLFES was \$1,619.79. Cameron & Co. administered the payroll once again at no charge. They included the provision of the employee records of employment and T4 slips.

In total, donations for 2022 were \$89,929.14. Donations were received from Tolko & West Fraser, totaling \$14,000. In-kind donations for lumber & plywood were also received from Tolko & West Fraser totalling \$3,800. In-kind donations from the Cariboo-Chilcotin Conservation Society for \$3,000 of instruction at our School Program were also noted.

Camp Rental Revenue for 2022 was \$100,576.75. Viksten House Revenue for 2022 was \$8,202.00 and 72 S. 7th Office Rental Revenue totaled \$13,200 for 2022. This brings the total rental income for Camp, Viksten & the Office to \$121,796.75.

The 2022 School Program cost a total of \$23,933.86, including groceries, cooking, bussing and the teaching of the modules. We received a bussing credit from School District #27 for \$3,900 to offset some transportation costs.

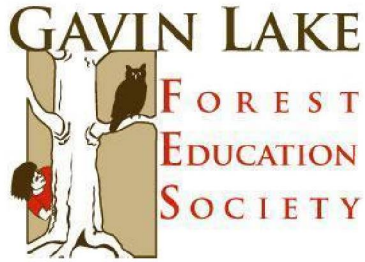

2022 AGM Camp Manager's Report

Highlights:

Without any Covid restrictions in place our traditional rental groups have come back in droves. The 2023 rental year is fully booked and the “in demand” summer months of 2024 are almost all booked up as well. We had **2455 people use camp this year** which is back to pre-covid numbers. Of those camp users, 1389 were free school groups (slightly up from last year). Once again we had more students and more teaching hours than ever before. There was a total of 76 groups (12% increase) using camp in 2022, 25 (25% increase) of which were paying customers. The resultant rental revenues were \$88,876.75. (more than double 2021 rental revenues). Viksten house rentals were \$8020.

Stuff We Did:

Major infrastructure projects included new porches on three of the biggest sleeping cabins and the construction of a new archery range building. We also installed a small bridge on the ski trails to ford a creek and established a natural history interpretive trail around the lake with the installation of 8 information signs. We also hired a permanent “assistant manager” in the form of Johanna Robson, which has been a good match.

Stuff We Got:

We replaced some of the workshop tools with safer, working equivalents. This included a chainsaw, table saw and compound mitre saw. The Daybreak Rotary Club along with Sandtronics and Home Hardware donated 4 new avalanche beacons for our popular “snow science’ module.

Looking Forward in 2023:

The balancing act will continue to be the income of rental groups vs the outlay with our school programs. A positive note is that both School Districts #27 and #28 are contributing financially in some way towards that program. Infrastructure funding has been secured from Moss Rock Park Foundation for the next 2 years with a \$100,000 commitment.

Participation

In addition to hosting regular classroom groups we also hosted other outdoor groups including "Salmon School" – a high school enrichment program for hands on learning with fisheries, Columneetza Outdoor education classes (3) and the Cariboo Chilcotin Conservation Society's Earth Challenge classroom winners.

We hosted 12 classroom day trips in the winter 2022 season and 17 classes for spring. With the change in COVID-19 restrictions, we hosted 21 overnight groups for the fall season. These overnight camps are the highly anticipated highlight of everyone's school year and we were so glad to bring them back for fall 2022. In total we had 1311 student participants in 2022. This number is higher than typical because we were unable to host overnight camps in the winter and spring. As a result we had the opportunity to host more day trips for individual classrooms. Due to the last few seasons of changes in classroom safety protocols, and a move to greater emphasis on outdoor opportunities, the school programs at Gavin Lake have expanded and evolved to support more year-round outdoor learning programs for all ages. This has been one great benefit of adapting to the COVID pandemic.

The spring season has evolved out of the need for outdoor learning opportunities during the COVID-19 pandemic. The season programs are adapted to all grades and modules are more flexible and are determined with the classroom teachers. Fall season continues to be our busiest and longest school program. The teachers and students were so excited about the return of overnight camp opportunities this year. We had exceptional weather for the entire season. With record temperatures above 20°C and sunshine every day.

Despite the first season of being back to overnight camps after a few years absent, and a few missing wooden spoons, the fall program was a great success! Thanks to our experienced module instructors including retired teachers Sandra and Kirstin who have brought students here for over 15 years, Roy Argue going on his 10th year of instructing, and Jenny Howell an exceptional fiddle player and longtime Gavin Lake Instructor with the Cariboo Chilcotin Conservation Society. We also had a new archery instructor, Larry Robinson, and orienteering instructor, Jo Robson. Jo also fills the Assistant Manager position and miraculously directed the six weeks of Grade 6 Fall program schedule. This allowed Mike to complete other camp projects and kept camp running very smoothly. So well in fact that one student was known to ask at one point "Whose Mike?" – a phrase that has never been heard in the history of the Grade 6 program.

Our new cook, Rebbecka Allen took on the kitchen duties as if she has cooked for 60 kids a day her whole life. She took hotdogs and chicken soup to a whole new level. The standard camp menu continued to delight and impress the sophisticated school children palates. The kids absolutely loved the spaghetti and garlic bread. We even heard it was one student's first time eating the dish - further evidence that kids get to experience all kinds of new things at camp and expand their horizons.
