I am writing to follow-up on our meeting at this year's Union of BC Municipalities Convention on September 17, 2024. Thank you for taking the opportunity to meet with Ministry of Emergency Management and Climate Readiness representatives; it was good to hear first-hand the matters of importance to you and your community relating to prioritization of road repairs to ensure access to egress routes in case of emergency.

I appreciate you sharing your concerns about the slides and bridges on the emergency routes that need to be repaired and understand the importance of having access to egress routes in emergency situations. For mapping and information to support your egress route planning, you may wish to contact Sandra Griffiths, District Manager, with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure at Sandra.Griffiths@gov.bc.ca. If you are not already familiar, you might also want to consider the Public Notification and Evacuation Route Planning stream of the Community Emergency Preparedness Fund (CEPF). This program provides support to develop plans for evacuation routes and public notifications. Applications are currently being accepted until April 25, 2025.

There are also funding sources available for risk assessments and risk mapping through EMCR's Disaster Resilience and Innovation Funding (DRIF) program that may be of interest for the Cariboo Regional District. Attached is a document outlining potential funding resources. I also recommend checking the Community Climate Funding Guide, a resource developed by our colleagues at the Ministries of Energy, Mines, and Low Carbon Innovation and Environment and Climate Change Strategy, for other funding programs that may be able to provide support for your projects. Please contact EMCR.DisasterMitigation@gov.bc.ca for more information about our funding programs.
