

How wildfire is fought in B.C.

We operate on land not governed by local burning bylaw, including Crown land, national & provincial parks, intertidal lands in the Strait of Georgia & private land not governed by open fire bylaw

Local governments respond within their boundaries

Interface fires are often multiagency, including our Fire Services program



Wildfire Act and Wildfire Regulation:

Provides us our authority to suppress wildfires & enact fire bans and restrictions

Defines obligations for everyone in B.C. with respect to fire use

Violation tickets issued by Natural Resource Officers (NROs) & Conservation Officers (COs), not BC Wildfire Service

Local Wildfire Zones

Wildfire Management & Decision Making

- Incident Command System (ICS) is used to manage wildfires and all-hazard incidents.
- ICS org charts can be scaled for each incident.
- There are varying levels of coordinated decision-making to manage wildfires.



Incident Management Team

The **Incident Commander (IC)** makes operational decisions for a single incident or complex of incidents. IC's report to the RWCO in the fire centre where they are working.

Fire Zone

The **Zone Wildfire Coordination Officer** (**ZWCO**) makes operational decisions for incidents within a zone (that are not assigned to an IMT). The ZWCO reports to the Regional Operations Officer (or RWCO in Operations Officer's absence). Regional Wildfire Coordination Centre (Fire Centre)

> The **Regional Wildfire Coordination Officer (RWCO)** coordinates resource allocation of regional resources within a fire centre.

Provincial Wildfire Coordination Centre (HQ-Kamloops)

The **Provincial Wildfire Coordination Officer** (**PWCO**) coordinates resource allocation of provincial resources.





BCWS Crews & ground personnel

 BC Wildfire Service has 162 Initial Attack (IA) crews, 30 Unit Crews and 65 full-time Fire Crew Supervisors

Each IMT has an Information Officer




The Cariboo Fire Centre and Regional Wildfire Coordination Centre (RWCC) is in Williams Lake.

Located within the region are four zones: Quesnel, Chilcotin, Central Cariboo and 100 Mile House.

Crews in each Zone: Quesnel Blackwater Unit Crew 4 Initial Attack Crews Chilcotin Ravens Unit Crew Central Cariboo Vesta Unit Crew 8 Initial Attack Crews 100 Mile House Stormriders Unit Crew 2 Initial Attack Crews





Other BCWS resources

Aviation

- 28 Air Tankers (land-based and skimmers) and bird-dog aircraft
- Rotary wing (helicopters), can surge to 150+
- Drones (reconnaissance, hot spot scanning)


Prevention Overview

Since 2017, 4 of 5 most destructive, costly wildfire seasons in B.C. history

- Thousands of homes destroyed
- > Tens of thousands of evacuees
- Billions in suppression costs
- > Over 75,000 square kilometres of forest burned
- > 100s of millions of tonnes of carbon dioxide emitted
- Lives lost, incalculable impacts on physical and mental health

Sustained increase in extreme wildfire behaviour and events, particularly in the wildland-urban interface (WUI)

Program goal: reduce the negative impacts of wildfire on public safety, property, the environment and the economy


2024 Prescribed Burns

Information that BC Wildfire Service does not manage • Structure loss

- Evacuation alerts & orders, structure loss (regional/provincial)
- Emergency response, assistance to individuals/communities

• Road/highway corridor closures

- Other wildfire impacts to transportation corridors
- BC Parks affected by wildfire (impacts, closures)
- Category 1 (campfire) prohibition enforcement, tickets and fines
- Air quality, smoke effects
 - Human caused wildfire investigations, penalties and fines
 - Political issues and policy



Holds information on the provincial wildfire situation, provincial and fire centre statistics, evacuations, resources, fire bans and prohibitions and more.




Wildfire Map

features








Layer filters






Wildfire of Note
